## **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

The 7/8 and 8/8 English Language Arts course is designed for students who have one or two credits of English left to complete for their diploma. The course is designed around a designated theme for the year and all materials will support the theme. This year we are focusing on UTOPIAN/DYSTOPIAN literature. The students will learn critical analysis of text (literary analysis through element and device and analysis in fiction: information analysis through rhetoric and source critique in nonfiction), formulate informed and evidence-based arguments based on analysis and construct a range of written products (e.g. literary criticism, persuasive essays, creative writing products., etc.)

Students will analyze literature through the lens of an author's intent and use of craft. The will write their analyses as well as persuasive arguments (using multiple sources) with proper structure, transitions and in-text citations. They will also learn to analyze the rhetoric of arguments and emulate such tools of rhetoric in their arguments.

#### UNIT 1:

Students will read <u>1984</u>, George Orwell's classic Utopian or Dystopian book about an orderly society where all things work well as long as everyone does exactly what they are assigned to do by Big Brother who is ALWAYS watching.

### UNIT 2:

We read <u>The Circle</u> by Dave Eggers as a counter piece to Orwell. It is the story of a girl who works at a large technology company who loses her free will but gains so much more, or does she? We analyze the usefulness of technology, the conveniences of everyday and the concept of the ideal state as laid out by Plato.

#### Unit 3:

We analyze poetry and poetic structure/devices starting off with Utopian/Dystopian songs from the 1940s to the present. Students analyze the meaning of the poetry by studying the literary devices used by the poets.
