Students will read closely in order to understand and enjoy complex works of literature; perform the critical thinking skills necessary to deepen their understanding of a text; and interpret, analyze, and evaluate narratives, poetry, and drama, by making connections to other texts, ideas, cultural perspectives, eras, personal events and situations .Students will read informational texts to build knowledge, experience, and broaden worldviews. Students will improve their vocabulary, grammar, spelling and writing skills through daily activities and classwork, projects and essays.

Course Objectives:

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Understand that close reading is a strategy that helps them read with a focus in order to deepen comprehension and draw inferences from a text.
- Cite specific details from a text in order to support conclusions, connections, and analysis of the text.
- Determine central ideas or themes of a text and analyze their development.
- Analyze how complex characters (e.g., those with multiple or conflicting motivations) develop over the course of a text, interact with other characters, and advance the plot or develop the theme.
- Determine the meaning of words and phrases as they are used in the text, including figurative and connotative meanings; analyze the cumulative impact of specific word

choices on meaning and tone (e.g., how the language evokes a sense of time and place; how it sets a formal or informal tone).

- Write texts that develop the topic with well-chosen, relevant, and sufficient facts, extended definitions, concrete details, quotations, or other information and examples appropriate to the audience's knowledge of the topic.
- Develop and strengthen writing as needed by planning, revising, editing, rewriting, or trying a new approach, focusing on addressing what is most significant for a specific purpose and audience.
