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The first half of this year will focus on government and your role as a participant in the American political system. This class will touch on many different politics related issues like the Constitution, Trump's impact on politics, and how you can impact the way that our country (and our world) functions.

The topics we will cover will be as follows:

Unit 1: FOUNDATIONS of AMERICAN DEMOCRACY: The principles of American democracy are reflected in the Constitution and the Bill of Rights and in the organization and actions of federal, state, and local government entities. The interpretation and application of American democratic principles continue to evolve and be debated.

Unit 2 CIVIL RIGHTS and CIVIL LIBERTIES: The United States Constitution aims to protect individual freedoms and rights that have been extended to more groups of people over time. These rights and freedoms continue to be debated, extended to additional people, and defined through judicial interpretation. In engaging in issues of civic debate, citizens act with an appreciation of differences and are able to participate in constructive dialogue with those who hold different perspectives.

Unit 3 RIGHTS, RESPONSIBILITIES, AND DUTIES OF CITIZENSHIP: Active, engaged, and informed citizens are critical to the success of the United States representative democracy. United States citizens have certain rights, responsibilities, and duties, the fulfillment of which help to maintain the healthy functioning of the national, state, and local communities.

Unit 4 POLITICAL AND CIVIC PARTICIPATION: There are numerous avenues for engagement in the political process, from exercising the power of the vote, to affiliating with political parties, to engaging in other forms of civic participation. Citizens leverage both electoral and non-electoral means to participate in the political process.

Unit 5 PUBLIC POLICY: All levels of government—local, state, and federal—are involved in shaping public policy and responding to public policy issues, all of which influence our lives beyond what appears in the Constitution. Engaged citizens understand how to find, monitor, evaluate, and respond to information on public policy issues.

Category	% of grade	Description
Homework	40%	assignments that we do not have time to finish in class, or short term assignments which are designed to be done at home.
Classwork	30%	assignments which should be completed in class (DO NOWs, short worksheets, etc)
Assessments	30%	Test, Quizzes, Papers, Long Term assignments
Participation	15%	Raising your hand in class, helping your classmates, being respectful and following other class rules
