Global Studies uses a "thematic" approach to studying the world, in conjunction with the "regional approach" used in 8th grade Intro to Global Studies.

FAQ's

Do I use Mr. Afzal's Google Classroom or Pupilpath to find information about this course?

Pupilpath is used school-wide for grading. However, although you can find current grades and assignments on pupilpath, a comprehensive and chronological display of the daily agenda, assignments, important test dates, and links to resources, are found on Mr. Afzal's Google Classroom, which is essentially the textbook for Global Studies. Each day's agenda is listed 2-5 days in advance.

What should I do if I miss class?

Try to get caught up beforehand if you know you are going to be absent. Almost all worksheets or assignments can be downloaded and printed from Google Classroom. Find those items and complete them ahead of time if possible. Notes can be gathered from another student. When you return to class explain to Mr. Afzal or your support teachers on what you have done to catch up and ask if there is anything else you should do.

How am I graded?

Formative (40%): Quizzes, Daily Work

Summative (60%): Unit Tests, Map Tests, Projects.

What is your late work policy?

Students are highly encouraged to turn in work on time. All work for each unit must be turned in before the summative test for full credit. After the summative, late work will be deducted points at teacher satisfaction depending on each student's situation. After the marking period, you will not be able to earn credit.

What is your policy on retakes?

Retakes or test corrections will be available after each unit test and on some quizzes will be available. In order to have an opportunity for a retake:

- 1. All missing work must have been completed prior to the original test or quiz
- 2. The unit test review guide must be completed to my satisfaction
- 3. You must set up a time to discuss questions you have not been able to answer after studying thoroughly
- 4. The retake must occur within 1 week of the test, typically during Flex Time
- Only one retake of a guiz or test per semester
- No retakes on Map Tests, Open-Note Quizzes or Open-note Tests

What is your policy on extra credit?

Extra credit is offered occasionally but should not be counted on to increase the grade. All points will be added to the "Extra Credit" column of the gradebook in IO Classroom (Skedula/ Pupilpath). Complete the assignments and then Extra Credit will be used.

What is your cell phone policy?

MHS has a school cell phone policy. In short, students may not have a cell phone on their person while in class, including during Flex Time (lunch). All phones will be collected when students enter the building in a secure bag and space for the day. No personal cell phones will be allowed into the building. If a student does not adhere to this rule, their phone will be confiscated for the day and a meeting will be requested with their parent.

What else should I know to help me be successful in this class?

First, come to class curious and ready to learn. Secondly, be respectful. Be disciplined and thorough in your classwork. Pay attention to global, national and local news. Try not to focus on the tests, but on learning the

concepts and applying it to the real world, since that is how you will use this knowledge in the future. Lastly, use Flex Time and Google Classroom for academic support and find motivated peers to join a study group.
