Course Overview: Global Studies is a year-long course designed to strengthen a student's skills in geography while also deepening their knowledge of modern history and current events. We will study all regions of the world, with an emphasis on: Africa, Europe, and Asia. The purpose of this class is to help students develop skills in analyzing primary texts, performing research and composing written pieces based on historical materials and other supporting documents including Internet searches and other secondary resources. Students will become familiar with the importance of geography and culture and how not only have these two factors impacted the creation of ancient civilizations, but have also played an essential role in societies today. This course will focus on the history of the world from pre-history to the 1700's.

Course Purpose and Targets: The study of global history and geography is the study of humanity, of people and events that have individually and collectively shaped our world. A strong and effective social studies program helps students make sense of the world in which they live, allows them to make connections between major ideas and their own lives, and it helps them see themselves as active members of a global community. While knowledge of content is very important, it is equally important to engage our students in historical thinking. Students who are engaged and are challenged to think like historians, raise questions, think critically, consider many perspectives and gather evidence in support of their interpretations as they draw upon chronological thinking, historical comprehension, historical analysis and interpretation, historical research, and decision-making. – The New York City Department of Education Grades 9-12 Social Studies Scope & Sequence.
